Attendance Requirements

Summary of the Course

Subject Area: Music

In this final course of the Performance Laboratory sequence, you will strengthen and demonstrate your performative skills in music making by developing and presenting a performance project relative to your chosen stream, namely Music Pedagogy, Sonic Arts or Musicology. Workshops and seminars will support the preparation of projects and focus on contextual issues in performance presentation. You will also participate in an approved UNSW ensemble and take a leadership role as appropriate.

At the conclusion of this course the student will be able to

- 1. Apply advanced skills in musical performance execution and presentation.
- 2. Apply leadership skills in performance preparation and ensemble performance
- 3. Engage with scholarly literature and other resources for performance study in a scholarly and professional manner

Teaching Strategies

This mandatory course is included to enable students to strengthen and demonstrate their performative skills in music in the final session of the BMus program. Students will be required to develop and present a 25 to 30 minute solo or collaborative project in line with particular strengths and their chosen stream, namely Music Pedagogy, Sonic Arts or Music Inquiry. 8 hours of seminars and labs will focus on the contemporary critical context of a wide range of performance events and presentations; 8 hours of laboratories will provide the opportunity for rehearsal and discussion in preparation for the performances while 24 hours of ensemble training building on the work of previous experiences is also included. The rationale for this course reflects the position that twenty first century musicians need not only practical skills and knowledge but also a creative and flexible approach to delivering a musical product.

Assessment 2: Performance project(50

Details: You will be required to present a solo or group performance of 25-30 minutes in duration that showcases abilities in music making and/or performance-related skills. The performance may take the form of a solo performance, a group or collaborative performance, lecture recital or an appropriate performative event approved by the course convenor. The performance will be presented as an examination. Written report from examiner

This assessment component is subject to change or modification, contingent on the creative projects students wish to undertake in this course. This will be addressed in the first seminar of the course.

Assessment 3: Ensemble participation(20

Details: Part-checking test on musical material studied and performed in an approved UNSW ensemble during the session. This is the final assessment for the course. Direct feedback from director throughout the session and direct feedback on the part-checking test.

Submission of Assessment Tasks

Students are expected to put their names and student numbers on every page of their assignments.

Turnitin Submission

If you encounter a problem when attempting to submit your assignment through Turnitin, please telephone External Support on 9385 3331 or email them on externalteltsupport@unsw.edu.au. Support hours are 8:00am – 10:00pm on weekdays and 9:00am – 5:00pm on weekends (365 days a year). If you are unable to submit your assignment due to a fault with Turnitin you may apply for an extension, but you must retain your ticket number from External Support (along with any other relevant documents) to include as evidence to support your extension application. If you email External Support you will automatically receive a ticket number, but if you telephone you will need to specifically ask for one. Turnitin also provides updates on their system status on Twitter.

Generally, assessment tasks must be submitted electronically via either Turnitin or a Moodle assignment. In instances where this is not possible, it will be stated on your course's Moodle site with alternative submission details.

Late Assessment Penalties

Students are responsible for the submission of assessment tasks by the required dates and times. Depending of the extent of delay in the submission of an assessment task past the due date and time, one of the following late penalties will apply unless special consideration or a blanket extension due to a technical outage is granted. For the purpose of late penalty calculation, a 'day' is deemed to be each 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline for submission.

• Work submitted less than 10 days after the stipulated deadline is subject to a deduction of 5% of the total awardable mark from the mark that would have been achieved if not for the penalty for every day past the stipulated deadline for submission. That is, a student who submits an assignment with a stipulated deadline of 4:00pm on 13 May 2016 at 4:10pm on 14 May 2016 will incur a deduction of 10%.

Task with a non percentage mark

If the task is marked out of 25, then late submission will attract a penalty of a deduction of 1.25 from the mark awarded to the student for every 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline.

Example: A student submits an essay 48 hours and 10 minutes after the stipulated deadline. The total possible mark for the essay is 25. The essay receives a mark of 17. The student's mark is therefore $17 - [25 (0.05 \times 3)] = 13.25$

Task with a percentage mark

If the task is marked out of 100%, then late submission will attract a penalty of a deduction of 5% from the mark awarded to the student for every 24-hour period (or part thereof) past the stipulated deadline.

Example: A student submits an essay 48 hours and 10 minutes after the stipulated deadline. The essay is marked out of 100%. The essay receives a mark of 68. The student's mark is therefore 68 - 15 = 53

- Work submitted 10 to 19 days after the stipulated deadline will be assessed and feedback
 provided but a mark of zero will be recorded. If the work would have received a pass mark but for
 the lateness and the work is a compulsory course component (hurdle requirement), a student will
 be deemed to have met that requirement;
- Work submitted 20 or more days after the stipulated deadline will not be accepted for
 assessment and will receive no feedback, mark or grade. If the assessment task is a compulsory
 component of the course a student will receive an Unsatisfactory Fail (UF) grade as a result of
 unsatisfactory performance in an essential component of the course.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and design projects, as well as presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without credit.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or for the purpose of them plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including text, images, formulae and concepts.

Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study and one of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.
