


Social Procurement

Our framework

This framework demonstrates UNSW's commitment to maximize positive sustainability outcomes across our procurement practices and throughout our supply chains. It is designed around four enabling areas of focus: our policy, our process, our people and our suppliers.

The framework is designed to support UNSW's broader commitments, namely the UNSW 2025 Strategic Plan and Environmental Sustainability Plan 2022-24, with the particular aim of working towards the strategic goal of Social Impact (Sustainable Development and Equity, Diversity and Inclusion) and Climate Action (reducing value chain emissions), whilst ensuring that modern slavery, human and labour rights risks are addressed and minimized across UNSW's purchasing activities.

All road map actions are aligned with the principles of ISO 20400 — Sustainable procurement — Guidance and also support UNSW's responsibilities under the Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth). More detailed action plans to for each strategic priority are being progressively developed and rolled out.

Our policy

UNSW's Responsible Sourcing guidelines set clear commitments to drive impactful procurement activities. These shall be implemented via UNSW's Procurement Procedure and Policy, Modern Slavery Prevention Policy, Environmental Sustainability Policy and reinforces UNSW's Supplier Charter.

Our process

UNSW's procurement systems, operational policies and processes shall include provisions which support the implementation of the policy's commitments and maintain value for money considerations beyond price.
