



This Thursday night from 5pm is the Heaven and Hell Party in the Roundhouse. The party is free before 10pm for UNSW students and \$5 afterwards. So whether you're naughty or nice, get down to the Roundhouse to hear some of the hottest musical acts in Sydney. To support this outrageous claim, Blitz brings you the story behind the music.

Aiax

Ajax, the name synonymous with a powerful household cleaner and one of Sydney's best dance floor DJ's. Spinning tracks since 1996, Ajax will be taking you on a musical journey at this week's Heaven and Hell Party.

Ajax was originally an arts student; his MySpace biography claiming "At art school the media students teased him and the sculpture students used to steal his mo wax lunchbox and mix clay into his peanut butter sandwiches." The only solution for Ajax was to rise, rise to the great heights of DJ deck stardom atop his "electro freak acid muzik". And rise he did, creating thumping sounds including, Spin City (Central Station Records 2006), Tiga/Ajax ITM (2005), Ministry of Sound 'Mashed' (2003), Ministry of Sound - Bang Gang CD (2005), Remix Magazine CD (2001).

His fame spiraled out of control as many paid him homage, winning the: Technics In The Mix No.1 Australian DJ in 2006, Allen & Heath DMA Best Australian DJ and 3D World DJ of the Year 2002, 2004, 2005.

Soon Ajax's name was know throughout the dance floors of Sydney, and even across Australia, as his hugely successful club. The Bang Gang pounded many psyche into musical rapture. A man of not one home but many, he is known to reside at The Bang Gang, Chinese Laundry, Smut and Electric Disco. In their respective quests for world domination, many artists saught and gained his aid including: Scissor Sisters, Mylo, Felix da Housecat, Luke Slater, Tiga, Matt Safer (The Rapture) and Dexter.

Many may know The Jax and Doom Show, infamously invading the FBI airwaves 6-8pm Thursdays as part of Sunsets. His "art killing" styles have thrilled crowds at festivals including Big Day Out, We Love Sydney, Vibes On A Summer's Day, Field Day, Splendour In the Grass, Livid, Falls Festival, Good Vibrations Festival, Two Tribes and Gatecrasher.

So if you're in the mood for an art killing show, come bleach your mind clean with Ajax this Thursday.

The Martini Club

The Martini Club started as a group of friends jamming in a basement bar in Bondi 7 years ago. Since then, they've transformed into an eclectic group of musical mavericks consisting of DJ Pascal Pouzet, saxophonist Will Farge, the trumpet wielding Adam Burrell, percussionist Barel Watchel, drummer Mark Olsen along with the sassy and soulful singer Towera Smith. Together, these guys create a funky, stylish and infectious brand of music that gets everyone on the dance floor.

They've played the Good Vibrations Festival, the Luna Park New Years Eve Party, and even done the Cleo Bachelor of the Year Awards. Later this year, they'll be taking their music to the international stage with a tour of Beijing, China. But before they start brushing up on their Mandarin, they'll be playing this Thursday at the Roundhouse for the Heaven and Hell Party. According to lead trumpet player Adam "Sloth" Burrell, we can expect to hear plenty of "deep and dirty electro with some mad and soulful live sounds on top".

The Martini Club's sound is "rooted in house music, which has a confident, driving, primal beat. On top of that we put our jazzy sounds, or our soulful vocals, some Latin percussion, or some break-style drum beats to it to add that kind of live element. We're pretty much based off vinyl and live productions and we gear to what type of gig it might be and the occasion," says Sloth.

The Martini Club's music appeals to everyone, because it's got a little bit of everything in it. According to Sloth, people can't help but get involved, "When you hear it you just can't help but tap your foot and your leg starts to get a bit of rhythm about it. Before you know it, you're just strutting your stuff on the dance floor."

From talking to Sloth, you get the idea that these guys just love to have a good party, and they love to see everyone else have an awesome time as well. So what are Sloth's hopes for the Heaven and Hell Party? "I want people to let loose on the dance floor. strut their stuff, pull a few moves, impress their friends. Just break down the barriers. I think that's definitely a feature of the music we play, it's good quality dance music."

So how do you describe The Martini Club in three words? Sloth laughs maniacally before answering, "shaken, not stirred".

Mercy Arms

Just over a year ago, Thom Moore, Kieran Callinan, Ash Moss and Julian Sudek met in an inner city band room. After jamming together, a stranger offered them a gig. Their distinctive style, which could be described as grand, noisy and romantic, along with their sheer enthusiasm meant that the gig offers kept rolling in. A year later, the group now known as Mercy Arms is going from strength to strength.

The Strokes heard their songs and invited them on a national tour, Dave Sitek from TV On The Radio is into the band so much he stayed in Australia to produce their debut single, Kilbey/ Footsteps, to be released this year.

The group consists of lead guitarist Kieran Callinan, Ash Moss on bass, Julian Sudek on drums as well as guitar, and lead singer Thom Moore. "I'd like to think there's a certain chivalry and romance to our music. Be it a short refrain or a lengthier tune, we really try to make the melodies sound as bold as possible", says Thom.



This guy pops up in quite a few religions, including Christianity, Islam, Judaism and Baha'i, to name a few. In Christianity he is the angel who gets to blow the horn at Judgement Day and he foretold the births of John the Baptist and Jesus. In Islam he was the medium through which God revealed the Qur'an to Mohammad.

Gabriel has also had quite a few high profile popculture roles. He's been featured in too many films to count, the most recent being the 2005 monstrosity Constantine. The American heavy metal/punk rock band, Gabriels Fallen, named themselves after the angel, and many others have written songs about him, such as Cole Porter with Blow Gabriel, Blow. He's even a character in Seishi Kishimoto's anime series, 666 Satan. His most notorious role however was Gibreel Farishta, a fictional Bollywood movie star who was one of the main characters in Salman Rushdie's controversial novel, The Satanic Verses.

He is also known as "the Angel of Death", and "the Angel of Fire". If the Hell's Angels were ever looking for a real-life angel to recruit, Gabriel would fit right in.


Traditionally found in Christianity and Judaism, Metatron also plays a large part in Madonna's (current) religion du jour, Kabbalah. In Jewish scripture, Metatron is responsible for acting as God's representative in the daily upkeep of the Earth. This is a pretty heavy responsibility, even for an angel. Before the destruction of the Holy Temple, he was also the chief teacher of the Torah for Jewish children. On top of this, he sometimes acts as God's spokesperson, and in some texts was the one who told Moses to "ascend to God".

He isn't mentioned by the name Metatron in the Bible, but this is hardly surprising when you consider that the guy used 72 various names. To most Christians he is known as the Prophet Enoch, who was a scribe during his mortal life, and later became Heaven's record-keeper. Because of his life on Earth, he was also the Angel through whom God communicated with us mere mortals.

He also had a cameo role in the 1999 film Dogma, as the 'voice of God', as God's true voice cannot be understood by human beings. And if God's voice sounds like Alanis Morissette, I'm OK with that...

In Islam, Enoch/Metatron is also known as Idris and is credited with inventing the needle and the art of sewing. Which may not sound cool, but it is useful. After all, where would your Heaven and Hell party costume be if it weren't for the invention of the humble needle?

Metatron is still cool despite having to compete with the bad-boy "fire and death" angel Gabriel. But if you like a man of status, he is God's right-hand-man; it doesn't get much higher than that. He's also multitalented: the daily caretaker of the Earth, childminder, tailor, educator, secretary, and spokesperson - is there anything this guy can't do? Plus, who wouldn't want to dress up like an angel who sounds like he moonlights as a transformer?





Can't decide whether to go to this week's *Heaven and Hell Party* as an angel or a devil? Maybe you'd like to make your outfit a little more interesting than the standard fairy wings or devil horns? If you're lacking (divine) inspiration, here is your guide to some key characters from both Heaven and Hell.



Before I get into the demons, let me say that religious texts are not the most politically correct documents, nor do they really support the whole feminist/affirmative action movement. So, it's hardly a surprise that there are four female demons of prostitution; Eisheth, Naamah, Agrat and the most infamous, Lilith.

Also known as the Poetess of Darkness, the Imp of Impetuosity, and occasionally as the Serpent of Seduction, Lilith is featured predominantly in Jewish texts but can be found throughout Babylonian, Christian, Mexican, Greek, Arabic, English, German, Oriental and Native American legends. Whilst depictions of her character vary, she is always a seductress who inevitably brings illness, death and destruction. In modern Luciferanism, Lilith is seen as a partner or part of the Devil. In some legends, she is considered to be the first wife of Adam in the Garden of Eden, who left because she did not want to submit to his will and would not agree to male dominance. She fled to the Red Sea, where she and various demons produced hundreds of offspring. Three angels sent by God came to bring her back, and when she refused, God confiscated her children. Lilith spent the rest of her days seducing men and taking vengeance on those who earned her ire.

Her first debut in modern literature was in Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's. Soon John Keats and Robert Browning would be writing poems about her and John Collier and Michelangelo spent time painting her. In art, Lilith is a beautiful seductress, but not the evil (read: independently minded) devil-creature that Kabbalah texts make her out to be.

In Mesopotamian and Sumerian mythologies, Lilith is still a seductress, but an empowered one. Driven out of Eden by God's refusal to let her co-rule with Adam, Lilith spends the rest of her days using her long hair to strangle anyone who tries to oppress her or those she sees as less powerful. These legends and her representation in 19th century literature and painting caused some feminists to adopt Lilith as a symbol of female empowerment.

Succubi and Incubi

Succubi and Incubi are a group of demons in mythology and medieval literature who seduce or have sex with members of the opposite gender in their dreams. In doing so, they would suck all the energy from their victim in order to sustain themselves, sometimes killing their prey in the process. A Succubus is the female version, whilst the Incubus is their male equivalent.

According to the *Malleus Maleficarum*, the text used during the Middle Ages and Renaissance to prosecute witches, Succubi would collect semen from male victims. This is then used by Incubi to impregnate women with children, known as Cambions, who would be vulnerable to demonic or evil influence later in life. The most famous Cambion is the wizard Merlin from the legend of King Arthur. Some accounts say that once a Succubus had collected semen, she was able to morph into an Incubus in order to impregnate women.

In the 16th and 17th centuries, carvings of Succubi on the outside of pubs indicated that the building also contained a brothel. In Chile and Brazil, unmarried pregnant women blamed their fertilisation on a nocturnal visit from an Incubus. In Hungary, the Incubus avoided detection by transforming into a featherless chicken once he had impregnated his prey. (I'm not making this up!)

In Middle Eastern mythologies, the Succubus is a beautiful woman who takes revenge on men who have committed adultery. She seduces them and then castrates them with razor-like devices which emerge from her vagina. Hell hath no fury like a woman scorned...

Miss Relay was crowned, people wrestled in jelly, threw thongs and walked. And walked and walked and walked.

More than 350 students, staff and community members, forming 35 teams, took part in the UNSW Relay For Life, an 18 hour community fundraising event. Together they raised more than \$22,000 to fund research and vital services for people with cancer and their families.

The opening ceremony was attended by the Minister for Youth and

Volunteering, the Hon. Linda Burney, Professor Richard Henry and Professor Philip Hogg. The Minister and cancer survivor Celeste Powell officially started the Relay at 4.30pm. Cancer survivors and their carers led the first lap around the track and then the Relay began.

The Northwest patch of grass next to the Village Green was alive with tents and glowing camp sites as teams set up for the 18 hour relay. Masters of Ceremony, Rajeeve Verma and Claire Riley kept things moving through the night amidst

fire twirling, giant games, a sausage sizzle and yoga. Walkers were entertained by the Schmertmann Experience, the Unusual Suspects and Colubus Antics. The Candlelight Hope Ceremony was a beautiful reminder of the meaning behind the relay, to support cancer survivors and remember loved ones that lost the battle.

At 10.10am on Saturday morning the final lap was walked leading into the closing ceremony and bringing the first (of many) UNSW Relays to a close. To the committee, all the

volunteers, survivors and carers, talented performers, dedicated team members, UNSW and the Arc, The Cancer Council of NSW and the event sponsors and supporters, thankyou! In the fight against cancer these people rose to the challenge.

s the gloomy faces stare out the windows of a chock-a-block 891 when it passes me on my bike, I often wonder why more students don't ride to uni. How does being squished on a crowded bus next to someone who obviously didn't have time to clean their teeth compare to the sensation of the cool morning wind on your face as you feel the satisfying burn of that last incline in your buttocks?

With our waistlines and carbon emissions steadily increasing, it's high time that we incorporate healthier alternatives into our current unsustainable lifestyles. Bike riding is a great way to get into shape, help the environment and switch on your brain before that big exam.

Bike riding is a fantastic mode of transport for university students. Rising petrol prices and road tolls can make a sizeable dent in a student budget, especially if your timetable necessitates daily trips to uni. Even if you opt for public transport, it can often prove unreliable and too many bad experiences will have you reaching for the car keys every time.

There is nothing quite as frustrating as waiting for a seemingly non-existent bus or train when you're in a rush to get to class. Even the ferries are unreliable. After waiting half an hour for a ferry on the one day that I decided not to ride, an announcement said that due to tsunami concerns the Circular Quay ferry would be suspended. Tsunami?! What? As I trudged up the hill to the bus stop I concluded that I would be able to outride a tsunami any day.

Many of the discomforts that dissuade people from riding are understandable. Sydney's congested traffic and pollution can look like a smoggy jungle from the air-conditioned cocoon of a car. I am often left holding my breath as a truck

or bus roars past me leaving a trail of black smog in my path. But once you reach a pocket of fresh air you can start breathing again and power on.

When I first began bike riding I stuck to the footpath as tenaciously as a first time ice-skater clings to the rail. No matter how vicious the obscenities pedestrians hurled at me, or how many police cars passed me, there was no way I was going to venture onto the road. After a few months of riding my confidence and fitness levels greatly increased. Soon I began riding to Leichhardt from Kensington, on the road!

everyday instead of driving will save about 600 litres of petrol, and all the green house gases associated with that, every year. You will be helping to create cleaner air.

I would seriously encourage more students to ride to uni. Fortunately, the ride in both directions on Anzac Parade is relatively flat, so you rarely have to produce a Tour-de-France effort. Knowing that you have burnt off your breakfast by the time you reach uni makes having that mid-morning cappuccino so much more satisfying. Whilst your fellow students are collecting their scattered

After my raging heartbeat subsided, I found that keeping up with the traffic wasn't as hard as it had looked. Cars weren't nearly as intimidating as I thought they would be, in fact most were quite accommodating. You do get the occasional idiot who blasts their horn centimetres from your handlebars in an attempt to overtake you, but they are rare.

It's important not to be put off if you have bad experiences on the road or if other road users are verbally abusive. Be warned it happens, but just relish in the fact that you're getting fit and helping the environment, whilst they sit on their backsides pumping carbon dioxide into the air. If more people rode to work and uni then the polluted haze that lingers over Sydney could be greatly reduced. According to the Road Transport Authority, cycling just half an hour (10km) to and from uni or work

thoughts lost during the struggle onto the bus, endorphins will be pumping through your body and you'll recall all of the major points from last night's reading with ease.

Bike riding has long been considered an ideal form of aerobic exercise. Even though bike riding is a great form of exercise, it doesn't actually feel like you are exercising. What could be better? Often you are so focused on getting to your destination that you only really feel the effects of your efforts when you climb off the seat. It's a common fact that your health can be improved by building physical activity into your daily life. "If you cycle to places that you're going to anyway, you're getting your exercise without having to make time to drive to the gym." says Dr Chris Rissel, director of the health promotion unit at Sydney South West Area Health Service



Fortunately, I have the benefit of living close to uni so my bike ride is relatively easy, although when I want an extra work-out I pump my peddles hard up High Street. I don't recommend doing this immediately prior to a class. Having to wipe a seemingly endless stream of sweat from your brow is most unattractive and distracting. Obviously not all students are in a position to ride from home, but fortunately you're allowed to take your bikes on Sydney trains and ferries.

So why not ride your bike to the closest station, then get off at central and ride your bike to uni? It's so easy! It usually takes me around 15-20 minutes to get to uni from Central, but it all depends on your fitness levels and how fast you're prepared to ride. And bike riding is economical. You can purchase a good quality bike for a few hundred dollars, or you can get a cheaper bike from department stores.

Finally the authorities are starting to realise the benefits of bike riding, not only for public health, but also as a solution to congestion and pollution problems. Recently, Clover Moore announced the impending creation of 55km of separated bike lanes throughout The City of Sydney, so riders will be able to reach more destinations faster and safely.

A great way to travel safely in the meantime is to contact Bicycle New South Wales on (02) 9281 4099, they can tell you where the nearest "bike bus" starts its regular journey. Bike riding is a really fun activity and a fantastic way to get around. You can tone up; beat the traffic and lower green house gas emissions. So get on your bike and kiss that smelly over-crowded 891 goodbye for good.







Music: The Stooges The Weirdness

The Stooges were a hugely influential rock band fronted by Iggy Pop whose days of glory were from 1967 to 1974. In 2003 they reformed; it seems Iggy Pop is still alive. He's 60 years old, and this album gave him the outlet to explain how he's a dirty old man who wants to have sex with all the women he ogles.
